witness stand, the speaker declared.

The columnist was high in praise of Johnson's abilities to assume the duties of the Presidency in a time of great crisis. Johnson "is not as versed in foreign affairs as in other areas" said Pearson. He feels, nevertheless, that the President has great ideals, ideas and hopes for winning the peace of the world. The success of the Johnson Administration will depend upon its ability to maintain coexistence with the Communist World.

In 1960 Pearson interviewed Soviet Premier Khrushchev at his summer home on the Black Sea. Discussing a variety of topics Khrushchev indicated the true nature of the Sino-Soviet split. At a second meeting last summer the Soviet leader said that he was going to cut defense spending whether the United States did so or not.
