Following an extensive study of the institution's charter, the board adopted a resolution presented by a special charter study ommittee which will bring the charter up to date. The charter had been amended on five different occasions and had become cumbersom and unwieldly. Among other things, the proposed charter revision eliminated the clause which has limited students at Atlantic Christian to those of the Caucasian race. The resolution must be ratified by the N. C. Convention of Christian Churches which will meet in Washington, N. C. April 24-26.
