Dr. Tolochko stressed the fact that, although getting along with neighbors, both in this country and abroad. is important, getting along with ones family is of primary concern. Before we can hope to obtain world peace, security and understanding, we must achieve family peace, security and understanding.

Rabbi Tolochko also spoke to many classes while visiting the campus. In the classes he stressed the fact that he, as a member of the reformed Jewish order, feels everyone has a right to worship as he best sees fit. He definitly does not condem others beliefs, but respects all.

Before coming to Kniston, Dr. Tolochko served a congregation in Clarksdale, Mississippi, where he was prison chaplin, dean of the Mississippi Institute of Jewish Studies, and a student advisor to the University of Mississippi.

Rabbi Tolochko served as an Air Force Chaplain during World War II, and sice 1946 he has served as auxiliary chaplain at the marine base in Cherry Point. He received his universtiy and rabbinic training in Germany. He also attended the University of Pittsburg.

Dr. Tolochko has traveled extensively throughout Europe, Asia and Africa. He is the author of Judaism-Prayer Book With Transliteration; Hebrew for Beginners, Religious Scrolls and Concordance to the Apocrypha.

Rabbi Tolochko lectures on college campuses under the auspices of the understanding of Jews and Judaism through education.
