Larson Discusses U.N. Seating Of Red China

the subject of Dr. Nathan Larson's address to the student body during assembly on October 27. Dr. Larson, Professor of Law at Duke University, made it clear that something urgently needs to be done concerning this question. He said that with each passing year more and more nations are voting in favor of seat-ing Red China, and it will not be long until the U.S. must make up its mind about what it is going to do.

The question of admitting Red | U. S. take the initiative and China to the United Nations was on terms which we think are right. He said the danger in not doing this is that if we don't, Nationalist China may be thrown

"The conceptual argument for seating Communist China, said Larson, is that the United Nations should be universal, and that it is preposterous for almost a fourth of the world's population to be in fact unrepresented in a world organization." However, this argument is challenged by the statement that Red China is not a "peace-lov-ing state." He said the answer to this is not to say Red China is peace loving, rather to state that she has already been admitted and what is left is a matter of credentials: "who is China," or "who is entitled to represent China?" He also stated that it would be difficult for the major member nations "to speak from a background of virginal innocence in the matter of re-fraining from the use of force in international affairs."

Another argument against Red China's admittance, which Larson stated was more serious. is the feeling that it might disrupt the growth of the peace keeping capability of the United Nations at a time when the Soviet Union and the U.S. are beginning to show some ability to cooperate in this task. However, he also stated that the problem could be adequately handled. He said that the real question in this area is "whether this 'minus,' a very real one, is more than offset by some other 'plus' that would flow from the presence of Communist
