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#### Overman, Kirkland And Best Complete Roster For Offices

Students went to the March 13-14 to decide who they wanted to lead their government next year. Ballots were cast for the offices of president, vice president, secretary, and treasury for the Student Government Association.

According to the oficial ballot counts of the SGA, out of some 1500 students attending ACC, only 399 votes were cast. Dwight Wagner, president of the SGA remarked that this constitutes only 30 per cent of the student

In election results, Doug Dexter defeated Chalres Wolfe for the president's office. Dexter received 53 per cent of the ballots

Tim Overman, running unopposed, was elected vice president with a total of 372 votes.

Beth Best defeated Loretta Woolard for the secretary's post; and Ellis Kirkland, running unopposed for the treasurer's office, received 372 votes.

In a Tuesday night interview President - Elect Doug Dexter stated that he was "overwhelmed by his victory." In response to the question as to what he (Dexter) felt won him the election, Dexter remarked, "I hope I won it because of what I hope to do, the platform that I proposed to the students."
