

### Competition Is Open For Overseas Grants

On May 1, the Institute of In- mutual understanding between ternational Education will officially open its competition for 1969-70 United States Government and foreign graduate grants for academic study of research forming arts.

IIE annually conducts competitions for U. S. Government scholarships provided under the Fulbright - Hays Act as part of the educational and cultural exchange program of the U.S. Department of State, and for grants provided by various foreign governments, universities and private donors. Under these programs, more than 950 American graduate students will have an opportunity to study in any one of 50 countries. The purpose of the grants is to increase

Candidates who wish to apply abroad, and for professional for an award must be U. S. training in the creative and pertion, have a bachelor's degree or its equivalent before the beginning date of the grant and, in most cases, be proficient in the language of the host country. Selections will be made on the basis of academic and - or professional record, the feasibility of the applicant's proposed study plan, language preparation and personal qualifications.

For U. S. Government grants, preference is given to candidates who have not had prior opportunity for extended study or residence abroad, with the exception of those who have served in the armed forces. For foreign grants, applicants who have had extensive previous foreign experience are at a disadvantage but are not disqualified for this reason. For all grants, preference is given to applicants between the ages of 20 and 35.
