## New Year Commences For ACC

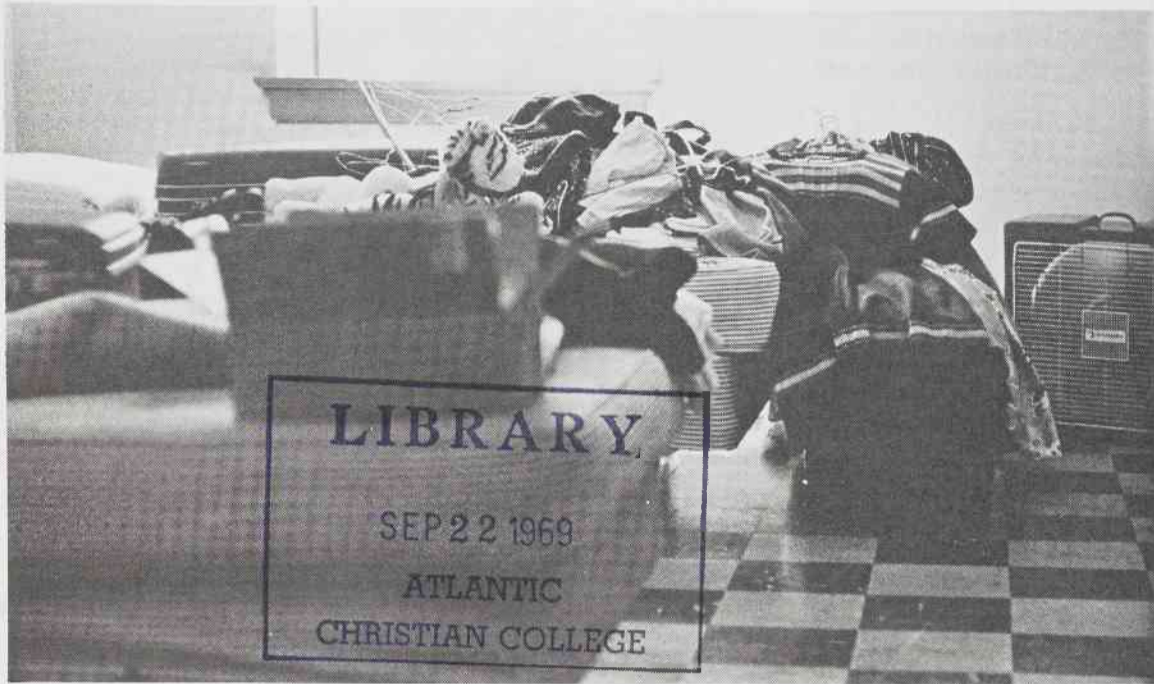
### New Rules To Affect Dorm Life

The 1969-70 Atlantic Christian College Handbook records many rule changes. These new rules affect both men and women resident students.

Sign-In and -Out cards for women are compulsory now only after 7:00 PM or for trips out of town, instead of the every-time-you-leave-campus routine. Sports clothes are now permitted at home sports events for female residents. Liberty passes seem to claim avid attention. Any permission for Freshmen is a special permission only first semester but extends to include second semester made within a fifty-mile radius. Sophomores are also limited to weekends, but they have a radius of one hundred miles in which to travel, juniors advanced to "any day" status but must remain within a one hundred mile radius. Seniors are unlimited. The freshmen women boast of curfew extension to a half-hour midnight and upperclassmen to 1:00 a.m. Second semester freshmen welcome the innovations of unlimited weekends. Sophomores are granted two nights out instead of the traditional one. While juniors and Seniors revel in an unlimited number.

Second semester Freshmen maintain the privileged ranks by qualifying for blanket permission. As the name suggests, a permission signed by the parents covers any weekend trip except beach parties. Special lay-by-play permission is no longer required. The biggest innovation for male residents is the dress code. See **NEW RULES** Page 4
