


Forum To Be Held

Elephants & Butterflies

A couple of months ago a very controversial booklet was distributed to students on UNC campus. That booklet, entitled "Elephants and Butterflies," is one of many attempts being made by concerned individuals to provide students with adequate sex information.

The booklet was accepted eagerly by students and feedback has been favorable.

The idea for the booklet came, after all, from students. It was students who did the research, compiled all the information, wrote, edited and published the booklet.

The authors, medical students, are concerned with the number of young people who are sexually active and exposing themselves to unwanted pregnancy. The booklet is dedicated to the prevention of the tragedy of unwanted pregnancy and veneral deases.

Through the efforts of these many others, students have been given

a source of information about the body's physiology, contraception, pregnancy, venereal disease and abortion.

But is this booklet enough?

True, "Elephants and Butterflies" can be considered a tremendous success. It has answered many questions and provided a great deal of much needed information. It has brought the question of providing sex education out into the open.

But most importantly, the booklet has stimulated people to ask other questions, questions that for so long a time have been repressed for one reason or another.

The booklet alone may not be sufficient. Society's changing attitudes toward sex education, contraceptive practices, abortion and real or imagined sexual activity have raised many medical, moral and legal

"The Braggart Soldier" To Be Presented

A two-act comedy, "The Braggart Soldier," will be presented by Stage and Script of Allantic Christian College, on March 11, 12, and 13, in Howard Chapel on the college campus.Curtain time will be 8 p.m. for each performance.





"The Braggart Soldier" is an "On the Way to the Forun" type of oomedy by Platus translated from Latin by Erich Segal who has received recent fame with the book "Love Story," which has been made into a motion picture.

The setting of the play is the third century B.C. when the Roman Empire was at its zenith. The most popular playwright of the age was a man named Platus who took great delight in puncturing the pomposities of Roman society. Highly placed Romans, particularly the military types, took themselves very seriously, so the author was restrained from writing about them.

Probably laughing up his sleeve, Platus merely shifted the setting of his plays to Greece, changed the names, but left Roman characters. The play was first produced at the Roman Games in 205 B.C. and was the most successful Latin comedy of all times.

The role of Miles Gloriosus (The Braggart Soldier) will be played by Lee Parker of Washington (N. C.), while Plaestrio, his old but Clever slave will be played by Marvin Winstead of Nashville, N.C. Acroteleutium, a courtesan is played by Fran Mercer of
