Davis Named Dean

Dr. F. Mark Davis, associate dean and director of special programs at Augsburg College. Minneapolis, Minn., has been named academic dean at Atlantic Christian College, according to an announcement by Dr. Harold C. Doster, president of the college.

Commenting on the appointment the president said, "We are indeed fortunate to have attracted the leadership of Dr. Davis. His experience in academic administration, special program development and faculty enrichment make him ideal to the present and future challenges at Atlantic Christian College.

"His years in our state, and his years of service at a churchrelated college similar in size and programs provide him with directly applicable experiences. His personable manner and creative mind will enhance his relationships and leadership," he said.

A native of West Virginia, he received the A.B. degree from Bryan College, the M.A. degree from the University of Tennessee, and Ph.D. degree from Duke University. He has taught at Northwestern College, Maryville College, and from 1968-72 was associate professor and chairman of the Augsburg College Department of English. He attended the Institute for Educational Management at Harvard Business School in the summer of 1974. As associate dean at Augsburg, he has worked closely with the dean of the college in developing, supervising, and evaluating new and special academic programs of the college. Presently he serves as director of continuing education, director of the internship program, director of freshman and transfer registration and orientation, director of faculty development program, and grants writer.

Davis also supervises the Center for the Conservation of Human Resources, the Social Science Research Center and the International Studies Center. He works with the dean of the college in the development and evaluation of the traditional liberal arts program and as a member of the president's staff, assists in planning and implementing the academic budget.

During his four years as associate dean, Davis has undertaken a number of significant projects — the most recent was a long-range study of the impact of retirement and tenure on the Augsburg faculty. Another project, begun in 1973, was researching and implementing a nursing program.

His wife Kay, holds an M.A. degree in elementary education from the University of Minnesota. They are parents of two children, Geoffrey 10, and Peter 7. They are members of the Presbyterian Church.

Interview With Davis

Rumors that the Search Committee had invited someone to ACC to become the new Academic Dean circulated all week amid warnings that publication of a story of the invitation could be an embarrassment to the college. Atlantic Christian College should have had more confidence in itself. Dr. Mark Davis, Associate Dean and Director of Special Programs at Augsburg College, Minneapolis, Minnesota apparently had little doubt about accepting.

An interview was arranged with he and his wife Kay in an informal setting, with a college newspaper, complete with nervousness, and mistakes. I warned Dr. and Mrs. Davis of the dangers of amateur interviewing. They reassured me that they would try to cope with any calamity which might be the result of the conversation. was not anxious to talk

We began talking about philosophies of education and the conversation quickly became intense.

"I have liberal ideas but I'm frustrated by liberal bigots who would suppress the ideas of others ... I have a strong dream element ... Women should be treated as equals ... I think probably the professor is in many cases more important than the course itself ... the power of ACC is its people ... I can't walk on water if the college is looking for a messiah."

In between nods of my head I discovered Dr. Davis has wide interests. Among them is a mature astronomy and the general discipline of science. He thinks the atmosphere of the college is exciting and hopes to add to that excitement.
