In order to pledge to the fraternity, a person must be voted on "by the entire fraternity, must have a grade point average of at least 1.7, and must be submitted a bid through the Dean of Men."

The Thetas have a unique system of pledging. All prospective pledges must answer questions from various topics. Topics range from sheer trivia to in-depth scholastic research which coincides with the pledge's major.

At present the Thetas do not have a house, although according to Spear this has the added advantage of making their fraternity less expensive. Also the Thetas do not have to contribute to a national governing fraternity.
