

Bulldogs Favored To Win Title

Atlantic Christian College became the clear-cut favorite to win the Carolinas Conference tennis championship Saturday by taking an 8-1 win over Guilford College, the defending champion.

The Bulldogs won five singles matches and then swept the doubles for their most impressive win of the season. Atlantic Christian and Guilford were expected to contend for the title this spring, and the Bulldogs will still have a fight on their hands, but Saturday's match certainly pushed AC to the favorite's spot.

Thomas Linne led the way with a 6-4 win over Markku Salokannei at one. Johan Sturen followed with a 6-4, 6-3 win over Howard Goodstat at two.

Scott Nichols had Guilford's only win, a 3-6, 7-6, 6-2 victory over Krister Eriksson at three. Greg DeFreitas defeated Lee Smith at four, Fredrik Ternstrand topped Gavin Behrens at five, and Lennie Burns broke into the AC lineup with a 7-6, 6-0 win over William Yancey.

Academics and the Athlete

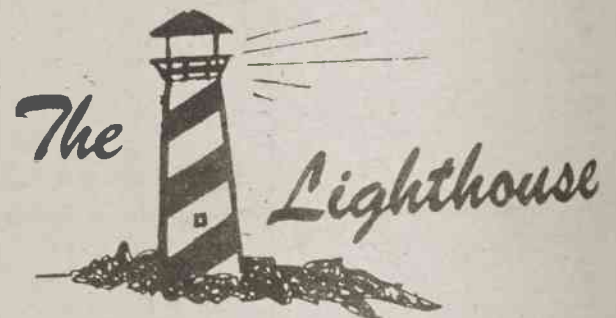
