A CHANCE TO SEE EUROPE!

The American-European College Student Association has planned an air flight to Europe this summer at student prices. The flight in DC-6's will leave Montreal, Canada (9 hours drive from New York City) on July 8, arriving in London, England and will return September 3. The cost to members is only \$300 per person, round trip.

This is even less than the round-trip tourist fare by boat. Subsequent European summer flights and Bermuda spring time flights are also planned. They will also send a free list of student approved accommodations in Europe. Free membership is open to all college students and teachers. USNSA Agent Ordered To Leave French Territory

Deportation of its European representative from France was acknowledged today by the U. S. National Student Association (USNSA). The representative, Clement Moore, received notice of deportation from the French Ministry of Interior on January 13. Moore had been a student at the Institute d'Etudes Politiques in Paris.

An oral explanation given to Moore with his deportation notice indicated that the sole reason for his expulsion was a speech delivered to the congress of the Union Generale des Etudiants Musulmans Algeriens (UGEMA) in Paris on December 26, 1957, according to USNSA. Moore delivered the speech as official observer of the U. S. National Student Association.

USNSA indicated that its officers have held discussions with the French Embassy in Washington and the Department of State in support of Moore's appeal from the deportation order. USNSA has made no public protest of the French action on the understanding that such a protest might be misinterpreted as an attempt at coercion, harming Moore's appeal and chance of resuming his studies in Paris.

Moore has enrolled at the London School of Economics for the present term. Moore graduated summa cum laude from Harvard College in June, 1957.

The deportation order stated: "Because of derogatory information collected about Clement Henry Moore (and) considering that the maintenance of public order and imperative reasons of national security necessitate the departure of the above-named alien from French territory . . . he is ordered to leave French territory."

The U. S. National Student Association is a non-partisan and non-sectarian alliance of 355 U.S. college and university student governments.

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
