# **Poet Leroi Jones Advises Students**

Black nationalist, Leroi Jones delivered a stimulating message to the student body of Johnson C. Smith University in Charlotte, N. C. The theme of his speech was that black students in American colleges must learn skills which can be applied to making black peopleself-determining and self-respecting. Jones advised students to struggle to maintain their black consciousness while at the same time to learn those things which can be applied to building black nations. He said that Black students must learn a skill that can be applied.

"Don't waste your time like white kids do while they are in college.

Mr. Jones placed great emphasis on the fact that the entire black community must be united in the struggle. He

"It takes a total community to make a revolution, not one element which is easily recognized and easily whiped out. You can't go into the black community and be blacker than everybody else,

more revolutionary than everybody else, and expect to succeed.

Mr. Jones stressed the theme of Pan-Africanism freely. He cited self--determination as the basic premise of the black struggle. He said that black people must govern themselves on all levels. They should control their own communities. the cities where they are in the majority and in predominately black areas.

Mr. Jones attributed self-respect as the product as the product of selfdetermination; Stating that blacks must create institutions that "legitimize" their own thinking -- in politics, in culture and in economics. He added that this was not separatism. but nationalism because whites have separated themselves from blacks throughout history.

Mr. Jones outlined four areas where blacks must develop their activities:

-Control of black communities and their organizations

-Making alliances with colored people over the world (Mexicans, Indians, and **Orientals**)

-Control over elected officers

Defense of black institutions against encroachment Leroi Jones gained national fame for his off-Broadway plays "The Dutchman" which won the 1964 Obie Award, "The Toilet," and "The Slave." He is also the writer of the poem "It's Nation Time".

"Sororities can promote some form of sisterhood, at least on this campus. At this point, sisterhood is something we lack. We need it in any way that we can get it."


