

New program makes educational goals easier for single mothers

Bennett is making it easier for single mothers to attend college while at the same time raising their children.

Through Challenge of Opportunity, a single-parent program implemented by the College's Health Care Services, mothers will be able to continue their education and enroll their children in the Bennett College Children's House for early childhood education.

Along with being required to engaged in appropriate work experiences, the student-mothers are re-

quired to participate in a parenting program, a sex education program and in a home management program to learn how to develop and maintain a healthy home environment.

According to the director of Health Care Services, Riley Kline, many other opportunities are available for these mothers.

"They are provided with bulletin board listings for jobs, career planning assistance, and transportation to school," he said.

Participants are also assisted in coping with and overcoming social, personal, financial and academic bar-

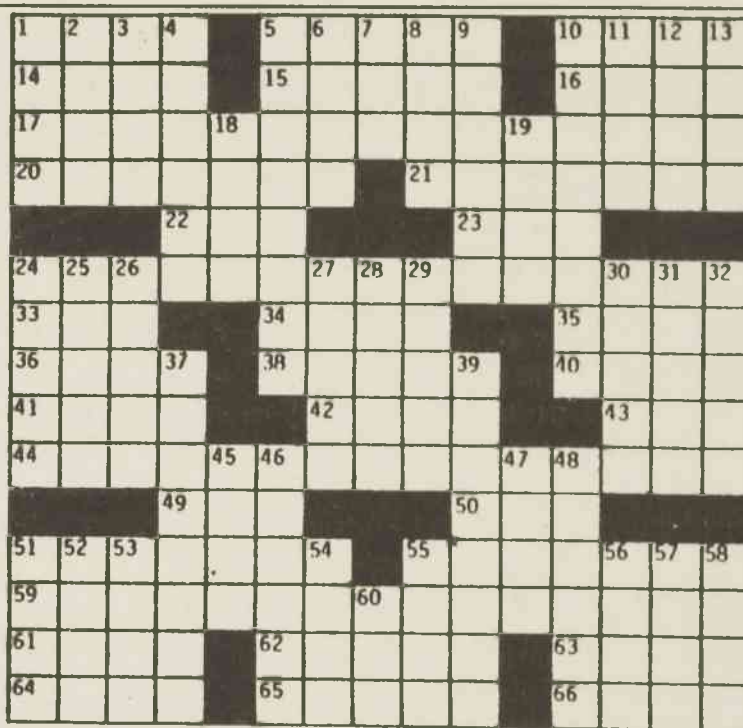
riers. Financial assistance is available for childcare and education.

The program provides tutoring help through video instruction on biology, history, research writing, math, and chemistry.

"Although I am ineligible for the program because of my educational status, I am happy that Bennett has made it easier for less fortunate mothers," said Kimberly Wright, a senior.
