According to"A Parent's Guide to Body Piercing," an article about body piercing in the September 1996 issue of Forbes Magazine, people who come from different ethnic, social and economic backgrounds get body piercing.

"I wanted to get my tongue pierced, but my grandmother would kill me," said Aiyana Sledge, a sophomore mass communications major from Stanford, Conn.


