
The deceased was one of the most highly esteemed women in her community and was beloved by a host of friends. She was a member of the Crumpler Baptist church.

He remained with the Barker family for three years after the war. Uncle Jesse has been married twice and is the father of six children by the first marriage. He has worked for the Chatham family through three generations and recalls with a great deal of pleasure the harvest times of the year when he worked for Mr. Alex Chatham, Sr. "They were the good ole days", so he says.
