MR. STRAUS GIVEN NATIONAL ACCLAIM

Transforming Raw Flax Into Fine Cigarette Paper Is Great Chemurgic Step

Mr. Harry H. Straus, President of Ecusta Paper Corporation, won national acclaim when on March 29th he addressed a meeting of the National Farm Chemurgic Council in Chicago, and announced that Ecusta Paper Corporation at Pisgah Forest, N. C., was successfully making high quality cigarette paper directly from American flas.

The Farm Chemurgic Council was organized five years ago by leading in-dustrialists, including Henry Ford, for the purpose of discovering and develop-ing industrial usage for farm products. Two years ago Mr. Straus, addressing the Conference, stated that experiments were under way for the production of cigarette paper from raw American flax and predicted that within a short time the project would be a success. On March 29th he climaxed the annual convention by modestly announcing that what only two years ago was a dream was now a reality; that in the Davidson River Valley, bordering on Pisgah National Forest, near Brevard, N. C., he had built a fårge factory which employs 900 people, and 24 hours per day turns out high quality eigarette paper made directly from raw American flax-opening up a market for 10,-000 tons of flax yearly.

This most recent development in the chemurgic movement was proclaimed in the press of the nation as the open-ing of a new industry in the United States. The leading newspapers of the nation gave it wide publicity and Time Magazine for April 8th carried almost a two column write-up with a picture of
