The purpose of the school is to teach the youngsters the rules and fundamentals of all sports in addition to actually participating in them. Last summer, sports covered to the property of th covered in the sessions included softball, baseball, touch football, boying boxing, wrestling, basketball, shuffleboard, and volleyball.

NEW ACTIVITIES

In order to give the youngsters a well-rounded program of ac-tivities, several new features will be added to the camp routine this summer. For instance, Jack Morgan, who is well-known to all of you through his drawings in THE ECHO, will give the boys some basic drawing instructions in drawing so that if any of the youngsters are inclined in art, they will have an opportunity to learn tiles in this field. Bob Bolt, who is an expert on farming, will teach the boys some fundamentals of agriculture. Swimming instructions and safety precautions which were worthwhile features of the first camp will again be included.

Charlie Russell, who assisted with the school last year, will be on hand again this summer. The remainder of the staff will be anhounced in next month's ECHO. Band Will Train At Camp Sapphire

The Ecusta band will train at Camp Saphire this summer. The school will open immediately following the closing of the public schools, the dates to be announced later, and will close August 3rd. The camp will be in sesion three days each week, Monday, Wednesday, and Friday, and the daily activities will begin between 9:00 and 10:00 a. m. and will close between 4:30 and 5 o'clock in the afternoon. Approximately 60 are expected to enroll in the school.

The supervision and training

of the band campers will be by members of our own music staff here at Ecusta and faculty members of the Transylvania Music-School Camp.

The program of study will include band instrument instruction, private instruction, group instruc-

Transportation Provided

With a full day's schedule on tap, band campers will eat lunch at the Ecusta Cafeteria and will be transported to and from the cafeteria by bus. The band will give regular concerts at Camp Sapphire during the summer season, it was pointed out by Director John Eversman.

Students with Ecusta's music project are accepted on the basis of their performances in musical aptitude tests, given at intervals during the year. School records, citizenship, and cooperative atti-tude are taken into consideration before accepting any student. Students in the project are required to do a specified amount of individual practice and study.
