Veterans Warned Against Loan Sharks Trying To Cash Terminal Leave Bonds

Ex-Servicemen Urged To Hold Bonds; Bills Are Pending In Congress Pointed Paragraphs

While Congress is contemplating legislation to permit the immediate cash payment of terminal leave bonds, veterans are warned to be on guard against loan sharks. The prospect of legislation to permit cashing of bonds has given rise to a bond loan racket of considerable proportions.

Operators work their schemes along the following general pattern:

A loan shark contacts a veteran and suggests that he can realize some ready cash for his terminal leave bond.

Many veterans who are in need of extra finances are entitled by the prospect of immediate cash on bonds which mature, at the earliest possible date, on April 1, 1948, and in most cases much later.

The speculator agrees to give the veteran 50 percent of the face value of the bond in cash immediately, hold the bond as security and pay another 25 percent if the veteran signs the bond when payment by the Government comes due.

Under this arrangement the loan shark realizes 25 percent of the bond's face value, plus interest

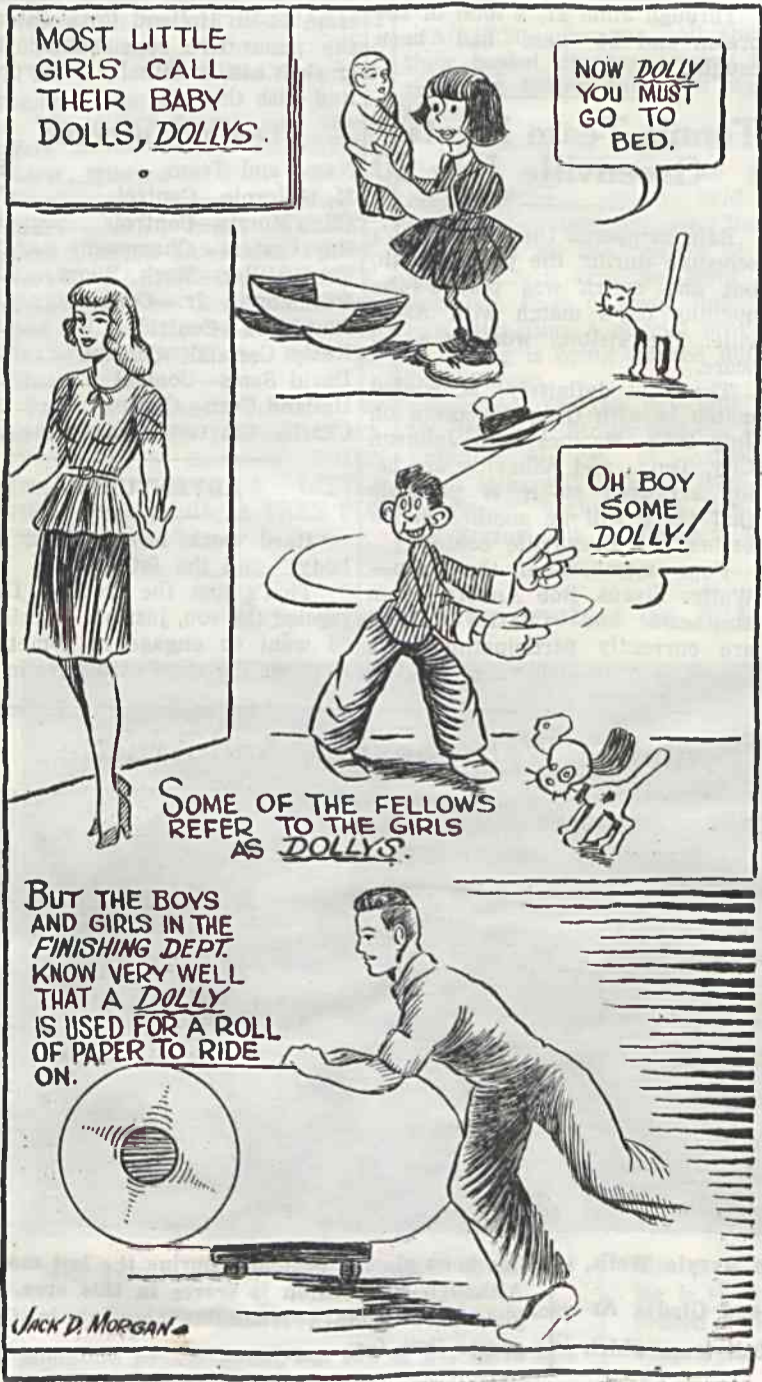

Unfortunately, there is no penalty provided in connection with usurious interest or other fees derived by a lender in such cases; so the veteran loses 25 percent of his bond plus the 2½ percent annual interest on the face value of the bond.

Veterans are urged to hold their terminal leave bonds. Several bills are now pending in Congress which, if they become law, will permit veterans to immediately get cash for their bonds.

Ed Happ And Son Get Prize Catches At Daytona Beach

Sonny checked in with a 10-pound barracuda to take over second place in that division, and Ed, Sr., has a fourth place with a sailfish that measured six feet, five and one-half inches and weighed 24 pounds eight ounces. The Happs fished from the deep-sea cruiser Gay Wind.

There are five prizes for 25 classifications of fish, and two grand prizes of \$500 each. The grand prizes go to the best catch in each half of the tournament.

TRY IT SOME TIME

Here's a story that you outdoorsmen will probably want to discuss and argue about before you believe it—and then you may not.

It concerns a Solumnar Table, as the originator calls it. Now, don't ask us what that means. We don't know. Maybe some of you do. Anyhow, one John Alden Knight, creator of the system, emphatically says that wildlife is more active at certain times of the day. He draws up tables to show you what time of a certain day is best to hunt and fish—that is, in the given area that he specifies.
