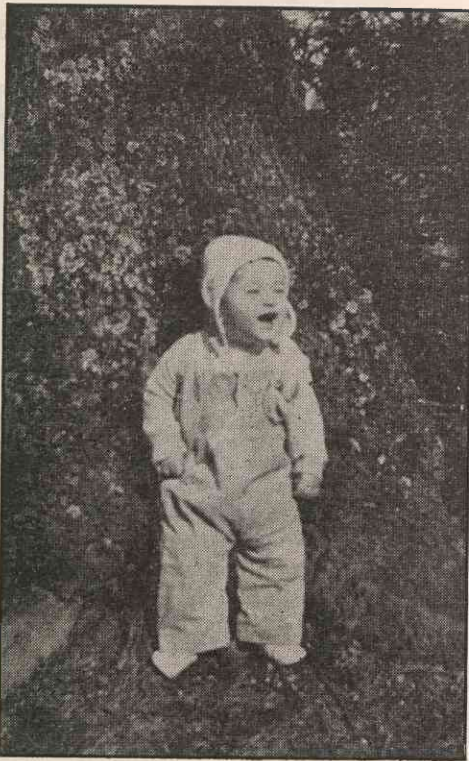
Earl York has taken his vacation to become better acquainted with David Earl. Mildred Scott has taken her vacation to move.
