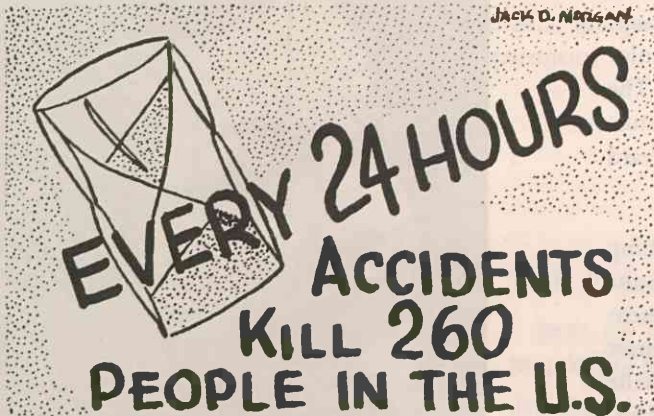


-Safety for
