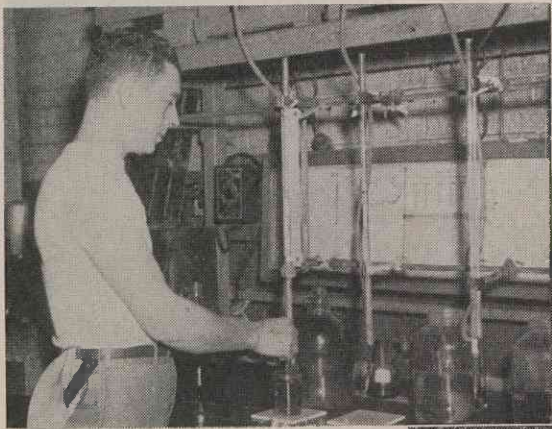


ECUSTA EMPLOYEES AT CLINTON

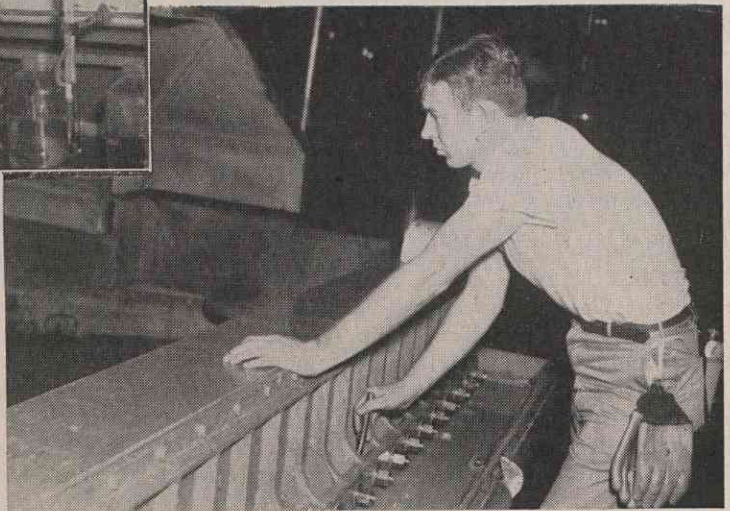


Charles Hamilton wrapping rolls of Cellophane.
