Members of the Personnel Department held a picnic at Camp Harry H. Straus. A good time was had by all—nuff said! To talk about picnics makes me want to go to one also.


F. S. (Buck) Best visited his old home town, Dunn, North Carolina. It had been a long time since his last visit and he enjoyed it a lot.
