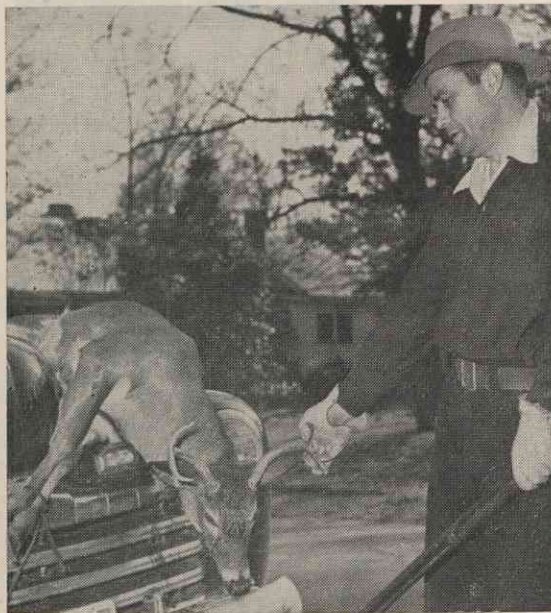
We lost a couple of fine fellows to the Navy. Bobby Dishman and Boyd Oliver. Wishing you the best of luck in the world.
