



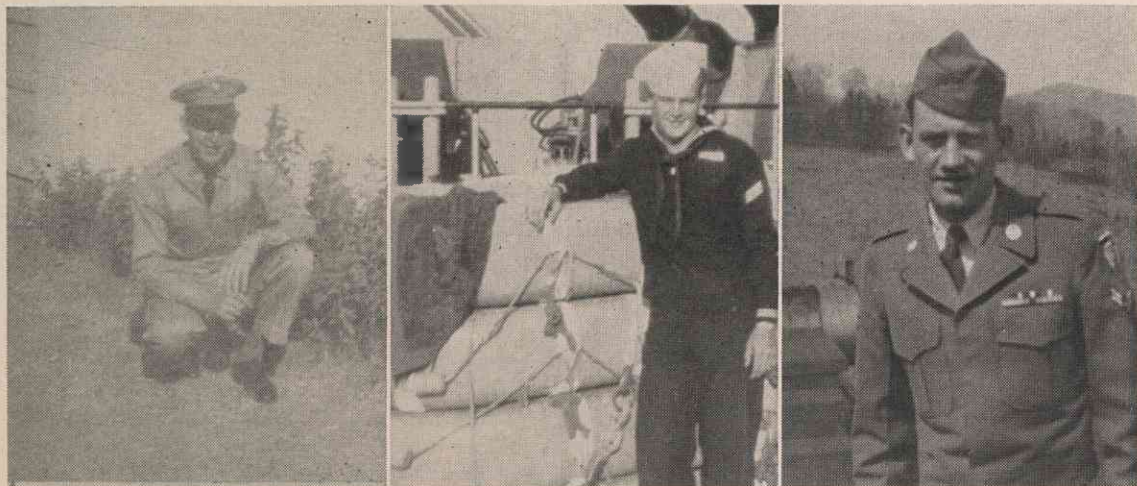
EMPLOYEES IN SERVICE
