

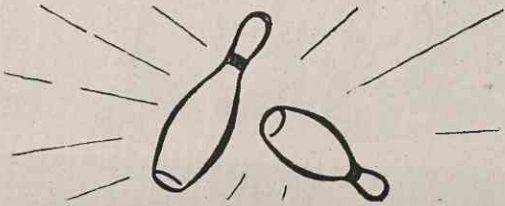
TEN COMMANDMENTS OF SPORT
