Asheville-Biltmore was represented by four students at the N. C. United Nations Model General Assembly held this year on February 22-25 at Duke University. Our delegates were Howard Williams, Mickey Schandler, Jim Rhinehart, and Ernest Miller.

Over 250 students from 1:0 colleges and universities discussed such problems as possible developments in the Congo, the Algerian crisis, and many other

world problems.

Mr. Frederick H. Boland of Ireland, President of the UN General Assembly, spoke to the assembly on "The Change in the New World. Arthur Larson, director of the World Rule of Law Genter in the Duke Law School spoke on the International Court of Justice. Mr. Larson is a former director of the U. S. Instruction Agency and onetime Undersecretary of Labor.
