UNCAA by '85-'86 UNCA jumps to Big South

UNCA is moving up in the world.

On Feb. 23, the UNCA Board of Trustees unanimously approved a proposal by the athletic department to join the newly formed Big South Conference and apply for NCAA Division II status.

The Big South will include: Augusta (Ga.) College, Campbell, Armstrong State (Ga.), Columbus College (Ga.), Radford (Va.), Coastal Carolina and Winthrop.

USC-Spartanburg is expected to announce it's membership in April.

The move will require the addition of baseball, golf and cross country at UNCA for the 1984-85 season.

"The baseball team will play at McCormick Field and the golf team will use one of the courses around here," said UNCA Athletic Director Ed Harris, "so we won't have to build facilities too soon."

Next year the men's basketball team will begin playing a schedule composed of 50 percent NCAA Division I and II teams and 50 percent NAIA schools. this time.

The women's team will continue to compete on th the NAIA level because io there are currently no tr programs for women in co the Big South.

"There's no women's program at this time, but there's a movement in that direction," said Harris.

"Two or three of the schools want to start their women's program on an equal basis," Harris said. "I think there will be some discussion of that in our conference meeting in May."

Until a decision is reached, the women will either remain in the NAIA or move up to NCAA Division II play.

The men will compete within the NAIA during 1984-85, but the Bulldogs will also participate in the Big South's five conference championships in baseball, soccer, cross country, tennis and golf next year.

The Big South expects all conference members to achieve NCAA Division I status by 1985-86.

Harris says that the move to the Big South is the right move at "Our problems with the independent division of District 26 con-

ion of District 26 contributed to the need to consider the move now,' said Harris. "Lenoir-Rhyne and

Barber-Scotia are considering joining conferences and are no willing to play us nex year. Gardner Webb als has decided not to play us next year," Harri said.

said. The UNCA athleti budget must expand t fill the needs of the new programs.

The athletic budget for this year is about \$200,000. Next year this will increase to \$350,000 and the projected budget for the 1985-86 school year is \$600,000.

To provide for this increase, UNCA's student athletic fee will go from \$36 per semester this year to \$47 per semester next year. It is expected to increase to \$50 per se-

mester in 1985-86. In addition to increasing fees, the

creasing fees, the Athletic Department will also attempt to raise \$100,000 through a scholarship fundraising drive.
