poll observers to assure precinct officials handled the election fairly.

"We had problems with this particular precinct (11) for years. There was reason to believe they had been counting the votes before the polls closed, which is illegal," explained Wilson.

Griffin said the GOP Security Task Force hired Winfield and him as independent poll observers. The committee contracted to pay them \$50 to keep check on five precincts, including Asheville Junior High.

According to Griffin, at approximately 6:10 p.m.

they saw a woman at Precinct 11 pull out a tally sheet, almost an hour and a half before the polls closed. Two precinct workers began calling out numbers as the woman wrote them down.

"John and I went in and standing approximately 10 feet from the polls confirmed what they were doing. John took two pictures. The people were stunned and began yelling at us," said Griffin.

Griffin and Winfield returned with their information to the Helms head-quarters. They were told to return to the precinct with Keller to keep watch

on further procedures at the precinct, which is predominately black.

Griffin said he informed them he was working for the GOP Security Task Force and attempted to hold down the tally sheets so precinct workers could not confiscate the information. There were at least three tally sheets according to Griffin.

Grover Mooneyham, chairman of the Buncombe County Board of Elections, requested that Lawrence Gilliam, Democratic precinct chairman, sign a warrant for the arrest of the men, according to court records.

Both Mooneyham and Gilliam refused to comment on the incident.

Griffin said police never read their rights, and the charge was not drawn up until almost two hours later.

"Those boys were arrested illegally. They had a perfect right to be at the polls, and to take pictures for proof of the wrongdoing," said Wilson.

Griffin said he hopes precinct officials will drop the charges.

"Everything we did was legitimate. I think it is an excellent idea to have poll observers. I would definitely do it again," said Griffin.
