## Race Relationship Discussed at Vespers

Last Sunday evening at Vespers Velma Sharpe had charge of the program on "Race Relations," at which time Lloyd Parks and Rev. J. H. Brendall spoke to the group.

In his talk Lloyd showed us the problems of the modern negro and all the hardships with which he has to cope. He stated that when a negro tried to enter some field of work and to better himself that he always met competition from the white man, who did not seem to want to give the black man a fair chance. And in various other cases he showed us how the whites in the past have done a great deal to retard the development of the negro, and then he offered various suggestions as to how we might overcome this situation.

Mr. Brendall was more general in his talk and took into consideration all the other races red, black, and yellow. He stated that if we should look under the skin we should discover that we all are blood brothers, and there is no reason for discrimination. Mr. Brendall also said that we cannot expect the foreign races to accept our religion unless we are going to live according to its beliefs ourselves.
