Tonight, in the auditorium, the students of Brevard college will have the opportunity of going to see the big four-ring circus, which is directed by Miss Carolina Gates and Mr. Bill Robinson. Various members of the student body will participate in the acts.

With Max McCracken as Ring Master, the affair promises to be entertaining to all spectators. Some of the main events will include an all-girls' football team, composed of the girls who have been dating the Tornadoes. To balance this act, the boys' football team will form a male chorus and serenade the lassies. Probably one of the highest points of enjoyment will be the scene from Jerome Kern's "Show Boat."

Among the other attractions will be some impersonations, a sermon preached from the text of Mother Goose, several circus clowns in costume, the Andrews Sisters in person, a hillbilly band and Ernest Tubb, Jr. One of the classes will sing the "Orchestra Song" as one of its annual projects.

There will be no admission charge for this full evening of entertainment, which begins at eight o'clock. However, there will be a supply of popcorn, peanuts, and other typical circus refreshments on hand for those who wish to get into the full spirit of the circus. The profits from these sales will be turned over to the Swicegood Fund.

Ministerial, Music Students To Give Church Programs

J. P. Porter, director of the Brevard college expansion program, five days ago sent out letters to approximately 200 Methodist ministers within a 150-mile radius of Brevard proposing a plan whereby the ministerial and music students of the college could get practical training in presenting church programs and at the same time contact prospective students.

The plans are for these students to go out in groups of four or five by automobile to the churches to which they are invited and present musical and religious programs. The groups would be made up of different students each time.

Since the letter went out, five ministers have shown their approval by inviting groups to their churches. One of the first of these trips will be over to Hendersonville.

\$600 Needed To Be Raised For Coach's Salary

Plans are now underway to put "Swicegood Week" over the top on Brevard's campus and according to Ray F. Swink, director of the program, it should be very successful. "Swicegood Week" came into effect when it was learned that the college would have to raise \$600.00 to pay the salary of Coach Swicegood.

The board of trustees of the college did not allot enough money to cover the costs and the decision was left to the students as to whether they would try to raise the money or let Swicegood go. In a recent chapel program it was decided that a plan would be put into effect to raise the money and this week has been designated as "Swicegood Week" on the campus.

A room to room canvass is in operation now to collect one dollar from each student and a table has been set up in the lobby of Dunham Hall to collect contributions from day students. At the latest count on Wednesday, it was estimated that something over \$100 had been received.

Plans are also underway to put on an auction Friday evening in the hopes of raising more money. Students will be solicited to give something that can be auctioned and Swink has agreed to donate several college plaques which he has.

"Coach Swicegood has been a great help to our football team this fall and it is hoped that we will soon reach the 100% mark," Swink stated.

Bailar Club To Present Dance At Thanksgiving

Frank Roberts, president of the Bailar club, has announced that his organization will sponsor the Thanksgiving dance which will be held Thursday night, November 25th., after the Brevard-Mars Hill football game. The battle between the two ancient rivals will be played at Mars Hill that afternoon and students will come back immediately following the game to attend the dance which will be held in the college gymnasium from 8 to 12.

At the Monday night meeting of the club it was decided that the dance will be semi-formal because of the trip to Mars Hill that afternoon. Members of the club will provide decorations for the affair and will sell tickets in advance. The price is \$1.00 per couple.
