Brevard College President To Assume New Duties On June 1

Dr. Eugene Coltrane, who has served as president of Brevard college since it was founded in 1934, has been appointed to the faculty of High Point college, it was announced last week. He will assume his duties there June 1.

The retirement of Dr. Coltrane as president of Brevard college was announced in early March, and it was understood then that he would continue in the field of Christian education in an institution which is operated under the auspices of the Methodist church.
