### Mr. Eliot Dodson Is Now With Math Dept.

Only one addition has been made in the teaching staff of Brevard college for the year of 1953-1954. Mr. Eliot Dodson is replacing Mr. Robert McClintock, who is now in the armed services.

Mr. Dodson comes from Columbia, South Carolina, and is a graduate of Clemson college, in South Carolina. He will serve in the mathematics department and will teach engineering courses. Mrs. Neal is a native of Australia. She attended school in the United States on a scholarship arranged by Eugene Ormandy, conductor of the Philadelphia symphony orchestra. She studied with Rudolf Serkin at the Curtis institute.

This history covers the period of 100 years since the beginning of the sister colleges, Weaver and Rutherford. When published, this will be the first complete history of this college.

### Rutherford College Scene Of Anniversary

The Reverend J. Julian Holmes, pastor of the First Methodist church, of Brevard, closed the event with a benediction.

### Brevard Instructor Inducted Into Army
