#### Old Gym Will See Its Last Game Saturday

Saturday night, the old gymnasium will see its last varsity ballgame. During the years the gym has been the sight of thrilling victories and heart - breaking defeats.

The gynmasium was built during the school year of 1937-38 and for the most part built by the students and faculty. Mr. T. M. Palmer was in charge of construction during this period. The students not only worked on the gymnasium but contributed money also.

In 1937, a "Buy a Brick" campaign was organized to provided the needed funds to construct the gym. On December 1, 1938, an appeal to the residents of Transylvania County was made through the Transylvania Times by President E. J. Coltrane. As a result of this appeal, sufficient funds were raised and construction was started.

Student labor was used for the most part, and the students even designed the building. The foundation was carefully laid out and built. This is evidenced by the fact that from 1938, when it was laid until the present time, it has not settled in spite of the fact that the ground on which it was built is very poor for construction.

After the gymnasium was constructed, it was used not only for ball games but for many social activities at the college.

### Harold Wilkinson Duke Chaplain To Be Director

Mr. Howard C. Wilkinson, Chaplain to the University and Director of Religious Life at Duke University, Durham, N. C., will conduct the Religious Emphasis Week at Brevard College from February 25 to March 1. Mr. Wilkinson was born and reared on a cattle ranch near Katy, Harris County, Texas. He attended Katy High School, received his A. B. Degree at Southwestern University, Georgetown, Texas, and completed his graduate work at Duke University in 1942. While at Southwestern, he was recipient of the Perkins Debate Trophy and the "Best Student Citizen" award.

In 1952 Mr. Wilkinson was selected as the "Lexington Young Man of the Year." The A. N. Marquis volumes, Who's Who in the South and Southwest, and Who's Who in Methodism, have listed him in recent editions.

Four fraternities claim Mr. Wilkinson as a member: Alpha Chi (international scholarship), Theta Phi (international theological fraternity), Pi Kappa Delta (national debate), and the Pi Gamma Mu (national social science).

From 1940 - 42 Mr. Wilkinson was editor of Christian Horizons, the Duke Divinity Journal. He was departmental editor of MOTIVE magazine from 1944 - 41 and of Prophetic Religion. from 1944 - 48. His articles have been been published in Christian Century, Christian Advocate, N. C. Christian Advocate, World Outlook, Contact, Presbyterian Tribune and the Emancipator.
