A native of Hot Springs, Mr. Barnett is pastor of Burkhead Methodist church in Winston-Salem. He has served as minister in the Western North Carolina conference of The Methodist church for the past 31 years.

"Strong leadership has characterized Mr. Barnett's ministry from the beginning, said President McLarty.

"He is recognized in the conference as one of the most effective leaders of youth," the president stated.

"And among the pastorates he held, Mr. Barnett planned and built new churches in Biltmore, Cherryville and Pilot Mountain.

According to President McLarty, the scholarship will provide financial assistance in the amount of \$400.00 per year and will be awarded to students on the basis of academic achievement and promise of scholastic success.

"DARK CONTINENT" MISSIONARY VISITS CAMPUS, SHOWS SLIDES

Miss Patricia Rothrock, a missionary social worker from Elizabethville in the Congo, returned to her native North Carolina in September, 1962. Miss Rothrock presented color slides which she had taken in the modern "Dark Continent" at chapel on November 8, to portray the conflicts which exist in Africa.

Miss Rothrock, who has spent three years in the Congo, is from Mt. Airy, North Carolina. She attended Woman's College of the University of North Carolina and received her M.A. Degree from Scarritt College. She has been Director of Christian Education in Mt. Airy and Hen-

riersonville churches. She served as a deaconess in North Georgia before she went to Africa.

Her primary concern in her speech was to correct the many fallacies incorporated into the trend of thinking when it comes to Africa. She presented Africa as a continent with growing pains, showing the great ranges of life from near-prehistoric existence to modern cities that are constantly springing up. New churches, new schools, and new work camps are visual evidence that Africa is undergoing a great growing process. Miss Rothrock plans to return to Elizabethville in August.
