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## Looking Back ON The Year:

The past semester has brought many significant changes to Brevard College and has proved to be one of the best teams in the history of Brevard College. All phases of college life have been touched by a wand of progression.

The term began August 27 with the largest enrollment in Brevard's history — 643 students, 369 freshmen and 274 sophomores, from twelve states and two foreign countries.

Harding, Jr. and former student Miss Nancy Ting.

Jeannie Selleck, Cathy Wayant, Dave Cooke, David Mullis, and Dennis Carrick were elected to the dorm house council in the capacities of dorm presidents.

Nancy Brockwell was chosen "Miss Brevard." Teena Windham was chosen first-runner-up in the pageant.

Plans for construction of a new cafeteria were released September 12 by Brevard College's new Business Manager, Mr. E. W. Hardin. The large addition to the campus is expected to reach completion early in 1969.
