With this chain of correspondence between the three parties, I was offered an athletic scholarship to Brevard College. When I found out the conditions under which the scholarship would be based, I happily accepted it.

The Brevard College campus

gives me a reminder of my native country Trinidad. The students and faculty are so friendly and encouraging that I hardly think one can find a better group of people throughout America.

Trinidad is known as the "Land of the Humming Bird." It is from this country that calypsoes which are native songs based on the everyday life of the people and of current events that occur throughout the world. We also have the steel band which is a form of a combo, and the bimbo type of dance has been originated.

Trinidad's weather is much different from that of Brevard. It is of a tropical type whereas Brevard's is of a sub - continental type. The coldest weather we have is about 50 degrees

Farenheit. The hottest weather ranges from 80-95 degrees.

The events I ran in Trinidad were the 400, 800, and 1500 meters. My best times for these events are as follows: 400 meters - 48 seconds, 800 meters - 1:4, and the 1500 meters - 3:58 seconds.

I have a lot of hope for the track team, but they are a bit dim for the cross - country. But, I am going to try my best to bring honor to Brevard College on the cross - country team.

Sociology Students To Build Model Community Projects

The Sociology Department, under the direction of Mr. William C. Allred, has launched a project to build model communities during this semester.

The project was presented to six groups that were derived from the two classes of sociology that is being taught by Mr. Allred. The instructions for building the model community appeared quite simple. Each group was to take a clear area and erect a thriving, well-planned and successful community.

The carrying out of these simple plans are not quite as easy as it may sound. The community does not necessarily inherit all of the bad traits of the modern community, nor does it necessarily inherit all of the good traits. Thus, the group is to decide what it considers good for the development of the community and what forces are prevalent in today's society that should be eliminated.

Purpose: Thought

"The purpose of the project is to structure a laboratory situation in sociology in which the participants will have to give thought to basic problems involved in running any society," commented Mr. Allred.

The first year sociology instructor, who also doubles as the Financial Aid advisor, points out that there is a reason in forming groups for the project and not having each student

submit an individual plan for a model community. The reason for this is that in the society today, people must work with one another to accomplish the goals that have been set. Mr. Allred pointed out that in getting the students into groups, it gives the man opportunity to prepare themselves for later work in society.

Major Problems

One of the major problems that will be facing the groups will be the decision as to what mores and folkways the community will have. Questions such as the stand on religion and on race, the governmental policy that will be followed, the family structure, and the economic distribution which will affect the community are some of the many questions that must be answered by the group.

Also the community will have to build streets, housing developments and decide what type of geographical location the new born community will have.

The students will be graded not on the type of community that is presented, but on what each student contributes to the development of the society.

Therefore, if a student works real hard and presents a lot of ideas to the group, even if his ideas are not accepted, he will stand to make a better grade in the assignment than would another student who presents no ideas but whose group plan is deemed a better community.

Mr. Allred said that the finished project is not as important as is the learning process involved in carrying out the assignment.

The students have until the end of the semester to decide upon, and to build their community.
