## New Addition To Gymnasium Is Dedicated

Students, faculty representatives, administrative officers and trustees gathered on the Brevard College campus Saturday, February 7th to pay honor to Cary C. Boshamer, one of the college's most generous benefactors.

Mr. Boshamer, a Gastonia industrialist and member of the board of trustees at the local college since 1954, was honored at a testimonial luncheon held in the Albert G. Myers Dining Hall Saturday afternoon.

Tributes were delivered by Ken Eaton, president of the Student Government Association, Chick Martin, athletic director and head basketball coach, Gil Coan, an alumnus of the college and member of the board of trustees, Allen H. Sims, chairman of the board of trustees, and John I. Anderson, editor of The Transylvania Times, and a member of the trustee athletic committee.

Approximately 180 people attended the luncheon, which was followed by a dedication service of the new women's gymnasium. Mr. Boshamer had provided funds for the construction of Boshamer Gymnasium in 1962 and for the addition to the athletic facility in 1969.

The new women's gymnasium includes another regulation size playing floor, four faculty offices, lounge, film room and classroom. In addition, new equipment for gymnastics and weight training were added.

Mr. Boshamer was guest of honor Saturday evening at the Brevard - Montreat - Anderson basketball game where he saw the Tornados establish four new school records as they blasted the visiting Cavaliers 139-65.

## Brevard College Students Participate In Tutoring

Tutoring plays an important part for many Brevard College students. There are four types of tutoring programs in this area. There are two voluntary programs which are for the low income group and the elementary school. The low income group is under the direction of the Western Carolina Community Action which derives money from federal funds. The community worker or Vista worker controls the activities in this area. There are about twenty-four Brevard students involved in this group which are associated with the Whitmire and Rosenwald tutoring projects. The major emphasis is personal contact and friendship which supplements the educational progress.

The elementary school tutoring is under the direction of the college and consists of approximately twelve tutors. There is a combination of both personal contact and education with the main emphasis on academics. The American Education 21 class also plays a role in the tutoring program. As a course requirement, they tutor and also help the teachers in the elementary school. By this, they are learning about schools by being involved.

The fourth type is for the high school level. College students receive \$1.50 per hour for tutoring students in specific subjects. There are still openings for those students who are interested.

The college students partici-

pating in these programs not only give but receive even more than they give. In the low income group, it helps bridge the gap between the have and have nots. These students realize how fortunate they really are and also understand the needs of others. Pleasure is gained by seeing the progress of the child and by knowing he sees you as a friend.

## Outstanding Black Leader To Speak Here At Brevard College

Hailed as one of America's outstanding Negro leaders by the NEW YORK TIMES, Dr. Eugene St. Clair Callender will speak at Brevard College under the auspices of the Mutual Concert Association Monday, February 16th, in the auditorium of the Dunham Music Center.

Since early 1968, Dr. Callender has occupied the post of Deputy Administrator of the Housing and Development Administration for the City of New York. With his appointment to this post, Dr. Callender became the second in command of Mayor Lindsay's new super housing agency for New York.

The present Housing and Development Administration takes the place of such former city agencies as the Housing and Redevelopment Board, the Rent Control Board, and the Department of Buildings. Among his many duties, Dr. Callender supervises building code enforce-

ments and fair housing in all government - aided middle income housing in New York City.

Prior to his present position, Dr. Callender was the Executive Director of the New York Urban League. His program to train and find jobs for Negro youths in Harlem, to establish narcotics clinics, and to discourage riots and other forms of violence attracted national attention.

Dr. Callender's lecture will be presented at 8:15 p. m. Admission is by season membership cards in the Mutual Concert Association only.
