Brevard College Co-Ed Is Killed In Accident Sunday

Sandra Leigh Dawson, a freshman at Brevard College, was pronounced dead on arrival at Transylvania Community Hospital after the car in which she was riding ran off Highway 276 and down a mountainside, five miles south of Brevard. The accident occurred at 3:10 p. m. on Sunday.

Terry Loren Kirkland, the driver of the car, was admitted to the hospital with minor injuries. According to State Trooper Z. V. Hawes, there was no evidence of drinking or

excessive speed. Hawes said that Kirkland had been driving north on Highway 276 when he swerved to avoid an oncoming car at a bad curve in the road. Kirkland's car went off on the right side of the road and then ran off on the left side and plunged down the mountain into a tree.

Miss Dawson was the second Brevard College student to be killed in an automobile accident since last December. College memorial services were held Tuesday night at the First United Methodist Church.

Brevard Is Invited To Wake Forest Symposium

Brevard College is one of eighty - three schools in the Eastern United States which will be invited to send 6 student delegates to a convention-symposium on "The Challenge of Survival: Not Man Apart" at Wake Forest University April 18, 19, and 20.

The symposium is called "Challenge '71" and is held every other year at the Winston-Salem, N. C., school on various problems confronting the country.

Speakers who have accepted invitations include the keynote, Ralph Nader, controversial consumer crusader and author of *Unsafe at Any Speed*; Harry Caudill, ex-legislator of Kentucky and author of *Night Comes to the Cumberland*; Dr. Rene Dubos, member of President Nixon's Citizen Advisory Board on the Environment and author of the Pulitzer prize winning book *So Human An Animal*; Irven DeVore, professor of anthropology at Harvard; Roger Shinn, professor of religion at Union Theological Seminary, and author of *Tangled World*; Daniel Bell, professor of sociology at Harvard, and chairman of the American Academy of Arts

"Commission on the Year 2000;" and, tentatively, Senator John Tunney (D-California).

The theme for Challenge '71, "survival," was chosen in response to the growing concern over the future condition of our environment. The first two days of the symposium will deal with commitment for the year 1971 and a call to respond to the challenge of the environmental crisis. The third day will be concerned with the question of how society and man is to accommodate rapid change and adequately plan for it.

and starred Richard Burton as King Arthur, Julie Andrews as Guenevere and Robert Goulet. Starring in the Brevard production will be Harvey H. Miller of the Brevard music faculty as King Arthur, Jane Hodge, a freshman voice major from Charlotte, N. C. as Guenevere, and Demming Smith, a Liberal Arts major from Goldsboro, N. C. as Lancelot.

The cast has been rehearsing in costume for more than a month. "The girls," said Mrs. Cope, "have to get used to dancing in big hats and flowing gowns; so the more they rehearse with them, the better they'll be able to do their roles."

The public is invited to attend the productions. Charges will be \$1.00 for adults and 50c for students.

New Constitution Passes By 27-1 Ratio

The proposed student constitution was passed overwhelmingly last Wednesday by a 27:1 ratio. The final count showed a favorable approval of 244 votes for and 9 against.

There was a note of disappointment in this victory. Only forty-five percent of the student body participated in the campus wide voting. Even fewer attended assembly to discuss the new document.

The members of the constitution committee worked regularly and laboriously during the first and second semesters. Their efforts totaled about 1000 hours of committee work. The committee consisted of Dave Chestnut, Lindsay Burbage, Bobby Kennedy, and David Holcombe, a faculty advisor.

This new document is more explicit than the former constitution and provides for a means of enforcing its provisions. The name of student government at Brevard will now assume the name Student Union and its offices are located in the Sims Student Union Building.

This constitution was written with much forethought and consideration. The value of this document can only be determined after the participation of the students is evaluated.

Legislature Will Provide Bicycles For Student Use

At the March 10th meeting of the Student Legislature a proposal was introduced concerning the possibility of bicycles on campus. The Legislature appropriated \$700 to initiate the program and organized an ad hoc committee to organize this program for the students.

Nancy Watson was appointed to head this committee. Nancy is the present secretary-treasurer of the freshman class.

The bikes due to arrive this weekend were purchased from Higgins Bike Shop out of Greensboro, North Carolina. The purchase includes 5 five speed bicycles, 5 ten speed, and two tandem bikes.

The only problem remaining is where to store the bicycles. Some type of arrangement is in the making with the school store, hopefully. There will, of course, be a nominal rental charge, but no prices have been set.

The Legislature urges the students to treat these bicycles with respect and care. The investment was an expensive, but a worthwhile one.
