Many Brevard College Students will welcome the next fall semester with a frown on their faces and a sag in their pockets. They will have to look forward to wearing their familiar outdated clothing and to spending their weekends with their books. All of this could be avoided simply by attaining a summer job.

Jobs Available

Twenty-five internships are available for students in the Department of Natural and Economic Resources' Summer Intern Program.

Applicants must have completed two years of college or technical training to qualify for the internships.

This is the program's third year. It is designed to supplement student classroom work with practical experience, while providing the department with assistance in problem solving, according to Dr. Arthur Cooper, Assistant Secretary of the Department of Natural and Economic Resources. Most of the internship programs are located in the Raleigh area, with some scattered across the State. The students usually work for 12 consecutive weeks between May 6 and August 30.

Among the projects to be covered are Land use planning, computerized inventory of state air quality and fuels, and geological properties of New Hanover County.

Christ thought serving others, as a summer staffer." then one should contact the Ridgecrest Concurrence Center, P. O. Box 128, at Ridgecrest, North Carolina 28770. It is a Baptist Conference Center where one can serve others, make make lasting friendships, sing, act, play ball, and "find your place in life and so much more!" Ridgecrest is a religious retreat covering 2,400 acres of mountain and forest land. It is located in the Western Blue Ridge Mountains. Its 275 young staffers regularly serve 30,000 guests each summer.

At the Blue Ridge Assembly one hundred young men and women get together each summer to work, study (earn college credits), worship, and play. It is a Collegiate Work Study Program sponsored by the Y.M.C.A. Blue Ridge Assembly, P.O. Box 248, Black Mountain, North Carolina. Their phone number is 704-669-8422. The average salary allotted is 100 dollars per month, which includes room, board, and medical insurance. If all averages out to about 450 dollars per season plus 100 dollars travel allowance. A minimum of 40 hours work per week is expected from each individual participation in this program.

For those in lording over little kids in the guise of a camp

conselor, there is the Camp Counselor Referral Service at Box 188 in Tuxedo, N. C. 28784. They have camp jobs open for qualified adults 18 and over in North Carolina, South Carolina, Georgia, Mississippi, Louisiana, Arkansas, Tennessee, Florida, Alabama, Texas, and Oklahoma. They need Program Directors, Cabin and Unit Counselors, Activity Leaders, and Boating and Waterfront Directors, to name a few.

For those interested in exciting, action packed, on the job excitement, contact Dean Moran in the Administration building on campus. He can refer students to summer jobs on campus, in town, or out of town, whatever one prefers. But, first one will have to fill out a Parents' Confidential Statement which can be gotten from the above mentioned person.

A degree in senior lifesaving can get a student a job as a life guard at anyone of the dozens of summer camps in the immediate locality. A few of these are Camp Carolina, Camp High Rocks, Camp Straus, and Camp Gay Valley.

Besides this, one can promenade to one's local employment agency, where a multiplicity of jobs are available in department stores, textile mills, machine shops, and alligator farms.
