B.C. Enrollment

Brevard College's fiscal year of 1979-1980 has the largest enrollment since 1853, with a populus of 708 students as opposed to 648 in the fall of 1978. The returning Class of 1978-79 was the largest in Brevard's history. The college's registration of foreign students has also increased dramatically since last year. There are 42 foreign students at B.C. thirty of those are Japanese. The mean SAT scores for enrolling students were nineteen points higher than last year.

The top five states in enrollment are North Carolina, Florida, Georgia, South Carolina and Virginia.

Due to the increase in boarding students, Brevard has had to initiate temporary housing for approximately twenty-five students at the Ross Hall Duplexes. The residents will hopefully be moved to dormitories within the near future.
