Mike Schmidt Is The 1980 World Series MVP

On Tuesday, October 21, 1980, Mike Schmidt became the twenty-sixth MVP (Most Valuable Player) in World Series history by having a .381 batting average for the series including two homers and seven runs

He is the first player to win the award for Philadelphia. This mark ties the Phillies with the Milwaukee Braves, San Francisco Giants, Detroit Tigers, and New York Mets for the least number of MVP winners in their team histories.

What team has had the most MVP's? The answer is, of course, a 3-1 deficit to the Milwaukee the New York Yankees with six. The Brooklyn/Los Angeles Dodgers are second with four.

Only three players have won the award twice. Sandy Koufax of the Dodgers won it twice, 1963 and '65, along with fellow pitcher Bob Gibson of the St. Louis Cardinals in 1964 and '67. As well as winning the award twice, Reggie Jackson is the only player to win the award for two different teams. He has won the award with the Oakland Athletics in 1973 and the New York Yankees in

Only once out of these twentysix years has a player for the losing team of the World Series won the award. In 1960 Bobby Richardson won the award for the New York Yankees by having a series mark of 12 RBI's (runs batted in) for a seven game presents the award, says in its series.

Many people, including Roy Face of the Pittsburgh Pirates, disagree with the 1960 award Face felt that either teammate Bill Mazeroski, who hit the game

winning homer in the seventh game of the World Series to win the series for the Pirates, or himself deserved the award. Also Richardson was the first nonpitcher to win the award.

Twelve pitchers have won the coveted award. Johnny Podres was the first pitcher in 1955, and Rollie Fingers was the last in

Don Larsen, of the New York Yankees, won the award in 1956 when he pitched the only perfect game in the Fall Classic's history. In 1958 Bob Turley, another Yankee pitcher, won the award by leading New York from Braves when he won the fifth, saved the sixth, and won the seventh game of the series.

The first rookie to win the award was Larry Sherry for the Los Angeles Dodgers in 1959. He won two games and saved the other two victories for the series.

The only nonsurviving member of the MVP's is Roberto Clemente. Clemente won the award in 1971 for the Pittsburgh Pirates when he batted .414 and hit two homers in the seven game series against Baltimore. Fourteen months after Clemente won the award, he was killed in an airplane crash while on route to Managua, Nicaragua, with relief supplies for earthquake

Sport Magazine, which October issue of 1979, "Clemente was, in the eyes of many of us, the most valuable of our most valuable players."
