Now Is The Time To Begin Transfer Procedures

If you are a student planning to transfer to another college next fall, now is the time to get started. As a college transfer student and according to the National Association of College Admissions Counselors (NACAC), you have some important responsibilities. One is notify all colleges and universities, which have granted you acceptance, whether or not you are going to attend. This notification date should be as soon as possible, or by May 1 at the latest.

Furthermore, two of the rights scissors and made shorts out of you have are very important to

have written information from any college you apply to concerning the policies of requirments and documents you have to have to be admitted; application fees, refunds and housing; ability of your courses to transfer, credit hours, and quality points, and the transferability of courses of grades less than C. Secondly, you have the right, at least one month prior to enrollment of any college lege, to be notified which courses you took will be accepted, the ones that will apply to your degree, and the right to know your accumulative grade point average, quality points, and how

many quarters or semesters it will take to get your degree.

Robert G. McLendon, Dean of Admissions at Brevard College, submitted these responsibilities and rights along with a few others to the NACAC. They were approved and will be of help to the transfer student. Dean McLendon is the chairman of the Southern Association of College Admissions Counselors and can answer any questions about these policies. Also, he can help correct any problem you may have concerning these rights and responsibilities during the admissions
