

Brevard College studying four-year conversion

Brevard College has initiated a feasibility study to evaluate the pros and cons of conversion to four-year status.

"We need this study," said Brevard College President Dr. William T. Greer, "in order to establish our long range goals and plans for the remainder of the '80s and '90s. Brevard College, it seems to me, is at a critical crossroads in its history. The days ahead in higher education are too volatile to be approached haphazardly."

Throughout June, Dave Skillen of Diversified Consultant Associates, Inc. of Atlanta interviewed about 80 community

leaders as well as college faculty and administration members.

"What we're trying to do," said Skillen, "is to see what the perceptions are about the college, and what is the emotional degree to which people will or won't support what will happen either way."

The result of Skillen's questionnaire will be statistically summarized in the report he will deliver to Dr. Greer this month.

The College's Board of Trustees initiated the feasibility study at their spring meeting. They will examine Skillen's findings at their fall meeting, Oct. 23-24.
