The Sept. 24 game puts Coach Don Scarborough's men at a 3-1 record overall, as of presstime. And the Tornadoes vs. Spartanburg Methodist victory was the one to see in these past two weeks.

The reappearance of goalkeeper Buck Rowlee, who was red-shirted last year, was a welcome sight for enthusiastic BC fans. The competition between Rowlee and Jakob Christensen for first string goalkeeper will be intense.

Two more Brevard attempts were made by Steve DeLong and Joseph Brooks before Vic Miriel scored to end the game at 3-0. This victory over SMC was long awaited since Brevard lost to them three times last year. DeLong commented, "Don said one day we were all going to have a good day—today was it. Revenge is sweet." Chun agrees, "We were comfortable today, and today we played like brothers."

The men's season opened with a disappointing 1-0 loss to the Berry College Junior Varsity Soccer team. Despite the loss, the game was exciting. The first half was a series of cat and mouse games from goal to goal. Early in the second half, Berry scored on a penalty kick. And Despite some beautiful attempts by Tom Misuraca, Chun, and Paul Holmes, the score remained 1-0 for Berry College. However, Brevard was back on the upswing the next day with a smooth 5-1 win over North Greenville College.

Andrew College was a bigger challenge to Brevard, both physically and mentally. In a very heated game, two penalty kicks would decide the outcome. Goalkeeper Christensen made a brilliant save early in the second half. The second penalty kick made by Yong Song gave BC their second victory of the season, 1-0. Ten yellow cards added to the intensity of the game.

This week, the Tornadoes travel to Montreat Anderson for a 3 p.m. Saturday game, and come back to host Anderson on Tuesday at 4 p.m. On Homecoming Saturday, Oct.11. the Tornadoes face the nationally-ranked Catawba College "B" team at 3 p.m. Oxford College comes to Brevard on Monday, Oct. 13, for a 3 p.m. game.

Men's cross-country wins big

The Brevard College Men's Cross-Country B team travels to USC-Spartanburg this Saturday after the first team scored a stunning opening meet victory two weeks ago at Wake Forest.

The Tornados, the four-time defending national junior college champions, were the only two-year school in the meet, but still whipped 12 other teams from fouryear schools including Wake Forest, Appalachian State, Duke, Depaul, James Madison, Radford, VMI, Furman, Liberty, UNC-Charlotte, Citadel and Roanoke College.

Calling the first meet "an impressive victory," first-year coach Dave Rinker said, "It was a great chance to see how well this team would react in an all-out effort. The best thing about the whole race was that we didn't show all our cards—we can still run better."

For Brevard, junior college All-American sophomores John Christiansen and Paul Carpenter dominated the Wake Forest University Invitational finishing second and fifth respectively in the 4.83 mile course.


Coach Rinker also was pleased with the

performance of three "very impressive freshmen," he said. Glenn MacDonald of Fairfax, Va., "ran a strong race throughout" to finish 10th and Nick Embrey of Stafford, Va., was on his heels place 13th. Dan Schneider of Erie, Pa., was Brevard's number five man with a 21st place finish.

Other Brevard men were Dean Duncan in 26th place and Sonni Dyer at 35th. In the open division Chris Dunn finished second with "a super effort," Coach Rinker said. Dunn, a freshman from Fredericksburg, Va., was all by himself over the last two miles. Brian Westrater was not far behind with a 6th place finish. Other Brevard men in the open division included Tim Cline of Marion, Va., in 11th; Scott Mitchell of Abingdon, Va., ¹ in 13th; and Jeff Breen in 15th.

The Women's Cross Country Team felt the temporary absence of number three runner Heather Chamberlain, finishing seventh out of a field of nine four-year schools.

The women were led by All-Americans Kim Nelson and Terrie Jackson who finished 18th and 19th respectively over the 5,000 meter course.
