Fred Beckey's name is known throughout the climbing world. He first began climbing in 1936 at the age of thirteen and at 82 years old he is still going strong. He spoke about climbing in Alaska, the southwest, and the Canadian Rockies. All of the speaking was based around his incredible collection of slides that he has taken over the years. The show, on top of the fact that he is a living legend, made the event a great experience.

The night started at 7:00 p.m. with a silent auction that had a lot of great items up for bidding including a rope, a tent and a pack; all bought for a tremendous value. The doors into the auditorium opened at approximately 7:30 p.m. and, soon after, a representative from the CCC came up and told the crowd of about 70-100 people that all of the proceeds from the show and the silent auction would go towards the goal of buying Laurel Knob.

Laurel Knob, a classic climbing destination, is only about an hour away from Brevard, and is the tallest rock face east of the Mississippi. The problem is that the mountain is privately owned, the landowner is selling it to the CCC for a great bargain.

After the introduction, a representative of Looking Glass Outfitters began Fred Beckey's introduction. He first thanked the crowd and the speaker, telling what most people already knew about the fact that he has been climbing since the 1930's and over the years has had more first assents than anyone on earth. This means he has climbed more unclimbed rocks than anyone else ever has.

His climbing partners are legends in their own rights. One of the most famous being Yvon Chouinard; the founder, owner and CEO of the clothing and gear company Patagonia. The slideshow was full of phenomenal climbs and expeditions Beckley has led or taken part in over the years. It was a great way to get out, see some great pictures, and listen to a living legend
