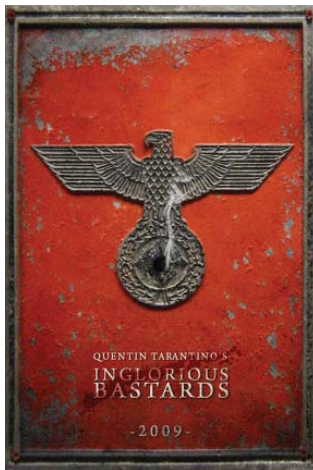
Intoxicants:

Film Review: 'Basterds' a bloody good time for Tarantino fans

You're either a Tarantino-fan or you're not. "Inglourious Basterds" is definitely worth watching, but wait for the DVD release if Tarantino's previous films failed to catch your entertainment.
