

## Minor changes made to housing lottery

*Green and West Jones dormitories reformatted for fall 2011, no additional changes have been made says Djuren*

This year's housing lottery is steadily approaching. The basic format will be similar to that in years past with a few minor modifications.

Next year Green Hall will have two male floors and two female floors, with room to spare for students who intend to apply for single rooms. West Jones Hall will be co-ed by suite. No additional changes have been made to the living halls.

"Not a lot will be different," said Jason Djuren, Director of Community Living. It will be held in the Dunham auditorium just as it was last year, on April 10 from 6 p.m. to around 10 p.m.

The lottery will consist of 30 to 45 minute

sessions holding up to 100 students at a time. The students that are to attend which session will be determined by class standing and grade point average.

Every full time student will be assigned a number starting with one and increasing until each full time student has a number. Those numbers will be mailed to the students' campus mailboxes after class registrations have ended. Students with the highest class standing and GPA will receive the lowest numbers.

It's also possible for someone with a lower class standing and GPA to find themselves in an earlier session. If an individual intends to room with someone who has a lower number than they do, they may attend the earlier session to choose a living space.

If students have specific needs or want to live

off-campus there are forms in the campus life office that need to be filled out and turned in by April 1. Each student is required to bring their number and student id to the lottery in order to shorten the length of the process.

Djuren said he would anticipate this process to continue, simply because it gives the students the power to choose if nothing else, the place they rests there heads—after learning how much they've spent for it.

## BC presidential search committee announced

The Executive Committee of the Brevard College Board of Trustees announced last Friday that it has formulated a Presidential Search Committee to help identify the next president of Brevard College.

The Presidential Search Committee will be chaired by Donald L. Moore, Jr. Moore, a Brevard native, is a member of Brevard College's Board of Trustees. He currently lives in Brevard.

The Committee has been tasked with helping to screen candidates by interviewing them and recommending a short list to the Board of Trustees, which will make the final selection.

- Dr. Ken Duke, the Dalton Professor of Environmental Studies and Ecology at BC and the faculty chair of the College's Strategic Planning Committee
- Lucy Matthews, president of Brevard College's Student Government Association

SGA president Lucy Matthews is the student representative on the committee. "I fully intend to speak on behalf of our students, supporting their wishes and hopes for the next president of BC," said Matthews. "I hope to spend time over the next weeks collecting statements and discussing the qualities that our students desire in the next leader of this institution."
