## GRE discounts, practice tests available to BC students

Now is the time to begin preparing to take the Graduate Record Examinations (GRE)! The GRE General Test is required by most graduate schools for admission. To ensure your scores are received by the deadline for the school of your choice, please review the timeline listed below in the chart.

On Aug. 1, 2011, the GRE revised General Test was implemented. The GRE revised General Test has some key changes that will impact how you prepare for the test, how you take the test, and when you can expect your test scores to be sent to the institutions to which you are applying. The test will still consist of 3 sections - Verbal Reasoning, Quantitative Reasoning and Analytical Writing.

There is an opportunity to save 50% on the test fee if you take the test before Sept. 30, 2011. That means it will cost you \$80.00 rather than the \$160.00 normal fee. For more information about the revised test, including how to register for the test and download
