If you are a freshman or sophomore, seeking a full time job may not be at the top of your priority list. But planning ahead for holiday & summer employment or an internship should be. Employers usually request a resume from their applicants, along with references and a cover letter. When you find a position you are interested in, it is prudent to apply as soon as possible. Having a resume that is professional and complete will make this task easier.

Having an outline for a basic resume as an underclassman helps you see what areas you can develop during your college career: activities, internships, work experience, specific job skills, honors and awards.

Examine those areas that need strengthening, and challenge yourself to build your resume prior to graduation.

If you are a senior without a resume, I urge you to get started now, and don't put it off until the week prior to graduation. A resume takes time and several revisions before it is ready for a potential employer to see.
